## What's been happening?

#### **Captains Flat workshop**

We held our first land manager workshop at Captains Flat on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> April. We were very lucky to be able to hold the workshop at the beautiful "Koomooloo", thanks to the generosity of Alistair and Ainslie MacGibbon.

The workshop allowed our group of local land managers to learn about how they can best manage native vegetation on their properties, get an introduction to some fascinating indigenous land management practices, and find out about the range of support and incentives that are available to land managers. We then rolled out the property maps and photographs, and got to work planning some on-ground activities with each land manager, according to their property needs and objectives.

It was a really interactive workshop, with lots of ideas springing around from participants and the MLC team alike. We're looking forward to the next stage - individual property visits with each of the workshop attendees, to really get into the project!

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### Managing native vegetation

Each newsletter, we'll give you a little tip to help you best manage your native vegetation. This newsletter we learn about the importance of maintaining standing and fallen timber on your property, in balance with cool patch burning. Please be aware that this is only a brief summary, and you should always consult with your advisors for more detailed information specific to your property.

## Balance the maintenance of standing and fallen timber with cool mosaic burns

Did you know that standing (both dead and alive) and fallen timber can be essential habitat for many native plants and animals? Standing trees, even dead trees, can contain tree hollows that provide important nesting habitat too. Fallen logs and leaf litter also provide essential foraging and nesting habitats, while many flora species depend on the micro-climate of logs for their germination.

While it's important to maintain timber on your property for habitat, traditional Indigenous management techniques of cool burning in small (mosaic) areas can help enhance native vegetation, and encourage food sources for some animals. Such burning was widely practiced across land in this area for many thousands of years, and can be a valuable land management technique when properly understood and applied.

Through the MLC project, we will be helping to teach land managers about how best to balance maintenance of timber with strategic cool mosaic burns. Used effectively, this balance can be a fantastic management tool to sustain and regenerate native vegetation patches across the Monaro landscape.







## The MLC project

The MLC project aims to improve the condition, extent and connectivity of patches of native vegetation across the Monaro region, in the Murrumbidgee catchment. Interested land managers can:

- Come along to a land manager workshop, to learn about native vegetation and how best to manage it on your property,
- Receive a property management plan, with tips and suggestions specific to the management of native vegetation on your property,
- Be involved in the application of Indigenous land management practices on your property,
- Participate in recording details of your project using the digital PlaceStories program, and
- Apply for incentive funding, through an agreement with the Murrumbidgee CMA, to undertake activities such as fencing, strategic planting of native flora, and control of exotic plants.
